Early Lupus Research Interests and Opportunities

The BWH Lupus Center is actively conducting a variety of research projects on lupus, including studies on early identification. We are still learning about how the immune system works in the early stages of lupus and our goal is to identify biological markers for onset and progression in early lupus patients. A better understanding of biological markers may also allow more targeted and effective drugs to treat lupus and matching of specific drugs for different sorts of lupus. Precisely defining the biological mechanisms of lupus is necessary to develop more effective and less toxic therapies.

- Systemic Lupus Associated T Cell Effects (SLATE) is a study sponsored by the Lupus Research Alliance & NIH-NIAID National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases to learn more how treatments and diagnostics can be improved for people with new onset lupus. Participants in the SLATE study provide blood samples and survey responses over the course of five visits in two years. If you were diagnosed with lupus within the past year and are not taking immunosuppressive medications or have had lupus for longer than a year and have active disease, please contact Eilish Dillon at edillon2@bwh.harvard.edu for more information. Most of the study visits will happen directly after regular clinical visits with the treating rheumatologist. Participants will receive a parking voucher for each visit.
- Pre-Lupus Immune Signature (PRELIMS) is a study sponsored by the US Department of
 Defense being conducted for patients who have some manifestations of lupus but have not
 been diagnosed and are not receiving immunosuppressive medications. This study involves
 blood collection and questionnaire data for up to two years. If this applies to you and

Most study visits will happen directly after regular clinical visits with the treating rheumatologist. Participants will receive a parking voucher at each visit and remuneration of \$40 after the second study visit.

This research and the work of the BWH Lupus Center team members allows the multidisciplinary BWH Lupus Center team of rheumatologists, cardiologists, and nephrologists to provide our patients with the most up-to-date care and treatment options. Updated CDC COVID-19 Recommendations

In early August, the CDC announced <u>its new COVID-19 guidelines</u>, shifting their focus to how people can *prevent severe infection* rather than the spread of the virus. The CDC does not recommend dropping all precautionary measures. The new guidelines stress vaccination to prevent infection rather than *requiring* regular testing, quarantining for people who have been exposed, mask-wearing and social distancing.

We know that this can be confusing and challenging for people with lupus. In general, people with lupus are at a higher risk for COVID-19 infection and severe illness. Lupus affects each person differently, and someone's risk level will vary due to disease activity and the medications they take.

We suggest that the best ways to protect yourself in the current environment are to:

• Get vaccinated and stay up to date on the recommended boosters. The current

Updated CDC COVID-19 Recommendations, continued

recommendations for patients taking immunosuppressant medications are for up to FIVE vaccines- an initial series of three mRNA vaccines and two boosters. Look for the new COVID vaccine this fall!

- Encourage the people around you to be aware of your health status and take steps to protect themselves and you--in particular to get vaccinated!
- Talk to your doctor about medications to prevent and treat COVID-19 and have a plan for what to do if you get sick.
- Evusheld is a monoclonal antibody injection for those who are immunosuppressed who may not make good antibody responses to the vaccines.
- Paxlovid is an anti-viral medication that can prevent severe COVID-19 if you take it soon after you turn positive.
- If you start having symptoms, get tested right away. Medications for COVID-19 work best when given early.
- Trust yourself. If you feel uncomfortable or unsafe about a
 gathering or event and you can stay home, then do so. You
 have every right to look after your health. Masking and social
 distancing do still work!


